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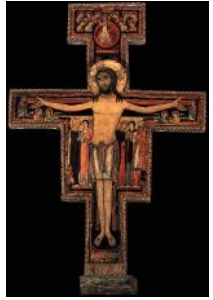


From the Editor

Remembering Joyce Craske

During Joyce's funeral, Father Leslie thanked those who had throughout her illness remembered and cared for them. His words were so touching that we asked him if we could reprint them in the November magazine, and he very kindly granted our request:

Before I read the appointed lesson I want to thank those who have had us in kind remembrance: I say 'kind remembrance' rather than 'prayers' and 'intercessions' since we have friends who do not belong to any church congregation and would, perhaps, find the technical language of the church difficult.

Four years ago, Joyce's charming and endearing Guernsey eccentricities began to be overtaken by strange imaginings and delusions. These in time settled down to an anxiety which centred upon the need of my continual presence and her inability to do those things which she once loved to do. In this, and what was to come, I had the help of my little family next door, with Sarah as the professional long-stop, with hardly a day passing without laughter.

I have a poor knowledge of the culinary arts, causing friends from St Stephen's, the Vale and from as far away as Rocquaine, to bear gifts in attractive pots to my door, containing superior, sophisticated dishes. To these friends I am, and shall remain indebted: as I am to those who visited us at home. Among them Father Michael of St Joseph's and Notre Dame, who consoled us with his blessings and the prayers of Catholics whose friendship we had 35 years ago when I arranged house groups to study the Reports of the Anglican Roman Catholic International Commission.

Throughout my nursing of her at home I was helped greatly by the daily visits of the joyful carers of the States, some of whom revealed that long ago I had visited their homes, baptised their children, married their sisters or buried their relatives.

Twelve weeks ago, when the addition of cancer had made staying at home impossible, Joyce was for two weeks nursed by our friend Jackie and other kind and experienced nurses at the Les Bourgs Hospice and was then transferred to the Chateau du Village, which nursed her for the remaining weeks of her life in a gentle and wonderfully professional manner. There I was able to be with her whenever I wished and where Father Moore took her the Blessed Sacrament keeping her in communion with this church in which she was baptised, confirmed and married.

The nursing staff at the Chateau, under their matron Rachel, whom I married to her husband at St Saviour's 24 years ago, reminded me of the first Whitsunday when there were gathered Parthians, Medes and Elamites and the dwellers in Mesopotamia, and in Judea, Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia. An example of 'every nation under heaven' working happily together in the care of others.

In 1959 Joyce and I volunteered for missionary work in Africa. We were sent a curious letter of instruction by the Society for the Propagation of Gospel, which was written perhaps by a former military man accustomed to posting up regimental orders or, perhaps it was in the customary form dating from the society's foundation in the reign of Charles the Second.

We were to proceed by sea to Cape Town and make our way north by rail to the city of Bulawayo and to report to the Bishop of Mataberland for onward travel to the Bechuanaland Protectorate. There we were to establish a mission, clinic and schools at a settlement called Madinare, then a remote desert-like place in a river delta. 'So, where do you come from, Patrick?' asked Joyce of the nurse who was to help her in her passage from this world. 'I come from Botswana, the more recent name of Bechuanaland, and from a village called Madinare.'so in our care for one another we become 'one nation under heaven'.

William Temple (1881-1944), the Archbishop of Canterbury, wrote in an essay on 'The Church':

'The Catholic Church is universal not only in space but in time: the living and the dead alike are members of it. "The gates of Hades shall not prevail against it." Death is no ultimate division in that society...indeed, we who are united by faith in Christ, are even now, as St Paul declares, in heaven....'

Fr John Luff continues to give us the fruits of his research into the clergy who have served as curates of St Stephen's:

The Revd T H Barnett

I remember some time ago being asked by a neighbour who was terminally ill to give the eulogy at his funeral. I had known the man for many years, but not intimately, so I knew little about his life. I asked him to write down a few facts to help me. On my next visit, he handed me half a sheet of A4 paper. Most of what he had written was about his wife and his son, both of whom he loved deeply. It was only when I got to the funeral, and spoke to people at the door, that I learned that there was a good deal more to the man than half a side of A4. Most significantly, when he was fourteen, he had dived into a frozen river and saved a young girl from drowning. He had received an award from the Royal Humane Society for his efforts in saving her life.

There are many people, like this man, who go through life faithfully, humbly doing their duty, and of whom we learn very little. One of these was the Revd Thomas Henry Barnett.

He was born in 1843 at Bristol, the son of Caleb Hattam Barnett, merchant, and Ann Gardner Steger. He was baptised at All Saints Church, Bristol on 30th July 1844. He had two sisters, one of whom married a priest, the other a spinster who was his life-long companion (he was a bachelor) and who died in her eighties.

In 1863 he entered King's College, London and graduated as a Theological Associate in 1867. He was made deacon in that year in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol with a title at St Philip and St Jacob in the city of Bristol (now commonly known as 'Pip 'n Jay') and was priested in 1868.

He remained in post for five years, before coming to Guernsey as curate of St Stephen's from 1872-73. Among the reasons for his coming may have been that his father, by then a ship-owner, was residing at 5 Sausmarez Street, St Peter Port.

Thereafter he returned to his home city of Bristol as Vicar of St Mark's, Lower Easton, where he remained until his retirement in 1915 - a total of

42 years. He did not enjoy a long retirement, as he died on 10th November 1920 at 8, Cotham Gardens. Apart from his brief sojourn in Guernsey he had spent all his life in his home city.

A brief obituary in a local newspaper reported that Mr Barnett had been greatly esteemed by his parishioners. He was 'one of the old-fashioned type of parochial clergy who took a deep interest in all affairs connected with the parish and was much loved for his kindness and thoughtful care. He took a deep interest in St Mark's Schools, one of the most efficient in the city, and exercised a great influence for good over the scholars, both boys and girls.'

A new brass lectern was dedicated to his memory at St. Mark's. The vicar of a neighbouring parish, at the unveiling and dedication ceremony, said that Mr. Barnett was 'a man full of character and a sincere worker and he was acknowledged to be the finest reader of the Old Testament lesson in Bristol.' Fr Barnett was, by all accounts, one of the great army of unsung labourers in the harvest field, who worked humbly and faithfully for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and is now numbered with the saints in glory.

Remembrance at the Eucharist

In a month when we traditionally focus on remembrance, it is fitting that we ask ourselves in what ways 'remembrance' occurs at the Mass, during the celebration of the Eucharist.

At the Institution of the Lord's Supper, Jesus 'took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in *remembrance* of me." And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood"' (Luke 22. 19-20; see also 1 Corinthians 11. 24-25).

In the liturgy that is pronounced at the Eucharist, almost all of the Eucharistic prayers (called 'anaphoras') contain a prayer of *remembrance* in which the Church calls to mind Christ's passion, resurrection and ascension into heaven. This part of the Eucharistic Prayer, called 'anamnesis' (from the Greek word ἀνάμνησις meaning 'reminiscence' or 'memorial sacrifice'), goes as follows:

'Therefore, heavenly Father,
we *remember* his offering of himself
made once for all upon the cross;
we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension;
we look for the coming of your kingdom,
and with this bread and this cup
we make the *memorial* of Christ your Son our Lord.'

In the anamnesis, we recall God's saving deeds accomplished in and through our Lord; and the memorial aspect of this prayer is not simply a passive process, but one by which Christians can actually enter into the Paschal mystery.

For the Eucharist is actually a *sacramental re-enactment* of Jesus's death on Calvary (although it in no way attempts to 'add to' the once-for-all sacrifice made by Christ on the cross). As the bread and the wine are consecrated, these sacramental symbols *make present* for us the self-offering of our Lord; they enable us to marvel again at the Incarnation of God in the life and fate of Jesus of Nazareth.

The narrative of the Eucharistic prayer is indeed a recital of God's saving acts; but the purpose of this recital is not simply a re-telling of the sacred story. Rather, it is an articulation of the desire and expectation that the saving effects of those past events may impinge, *here and now*, upon those who are assembled as worshippers.

Thus, the prayer appeals to the Father to send the Holy Spirit upon the elements of bread and wine, that they might become for the praying community the *very life and being* of Christ himself:

‘grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit
these gifts of bread and wine
may be to us *his body and his blood*.’

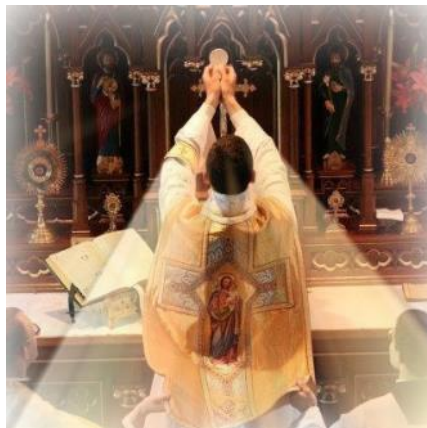
As the sacred gifts are distributed and received, we, the members of Christ's Body, are also transformed.

In our preparation for Confirmation, many of us were taught to consider sacraments as ‘Christian rites that were ordained by Christ, signs or symbols of a spiritual reality and a means of divine grace’.

It can be said that the Anglo-Catholic view concerning the sacraments goes beyond the classical Western view, which defines them as ‘effective signs’. More properly, sacraments should be considered not so much as ‘things’, but rather as ‘events’ in which heavenly and earthly realities meet.

Indeed, as the sacraments are celebrated, they remind us that one of the goals of worship is the making present of heaven and earth.
