As January flies past my window (literally and figuratively) I cannot believe how quickly time is passing. With all the hard work and many services, Christmas is gone and we are looking forward to Lent in a few weeks. Woah! Can someone please push a pause button and let us catch our breaths...

I think back to those days when, as a young boy, time seemed to last for an eternity. We used to leave home around 7.00am and meet up either at a friend's house or at a predetermined spot, and the day would stretch out as we cycled to a dam or went exploring. Someone said to me only last week that as we get older, the faster time moves. Perhaps it is because we get so caught up in the busyness of life, we have little time for rest or contemplation.

Christmas was a very special time in the life of St Stephen's; we were blessed to have a number of very moving services. My thanks to everyone involved in making the Church look beautiful and for all the work that went on behind the scenes. There is always a degree of sadness when the Wise Men and Humphrey (the camel) leave the stable and head off back East. That said, this year they may have welcomed the trip as we have workers inside the entrance to the Resurrection Chapel, trying to repair water damage from Storm Ciaran in 2023. Hopefully, using a new product from France, this will last a long time and not see the salting coming through as it did previously.

Sadly, the damage to St Stephen's following the latest storm Goretti saw a drainpipe blown off, as well as several roof tiles. We were exceptionally lucky that we had little other damage. One of the most fantastic advances in technology meant that we were able to get a drone to fly over the Church and Community Centre to assess the damage; and we were able to give the Insurance Assessor a very clear picture of what work needs to be done.

One of the great joys we have experienced at St Stephen's over the month of January has been Choral Evensong, led by the Choir of Town Church. It was during a visit to Town Church before Christmas that I had a conversation with their choirmaster, who expressed his sadness that they would have to take a break while the Town Church was closed for the installation of a new lighting system. I very quickly offered for them to use St Stephen's, and it has been such a delight to have them.

As I mentioned at the start of my letter, Lent is almost upon us. Ash Wednesday is on the 18th of February. Unlike in the previous two years since I have been here, this year we will not be holding a Lent Course (largely because I travel back to South Africa for a few weeks in March). We have the Church of England Lent publication *Draw Near*, which offers forty daily devotions for Lent. These booklets will be available for anyone who would like to exercise a Lenten discipline of reading one page a day. My prayer is that we, as a community, use the booklet and together incorporate into our daily lives the life-giving habits for our Christian walk towards the Cross and the Empty Tomb.

Dearest Friends, even though the time appears to be flying past, one thing remains constant and that is God's great love for us. Please remember that you are a beloved child of the loving Father. Thank you for all your love and support.

Saint of the Month

ST POLYCARP

Polycarp was one of the outstanding figures of the Early Church. As a young man he had known St John the Divine and other leading figures of the first generation of Christians. Polycarp is regarded as one of three chief Apostolic Fathers, along with Clement of Rome and Ignatius of Antioch.

Very little is known of his early years, but what is known is that he was made Bishop of Smyrna (one of the Seven Churches mentioned by St John in the Revelation) by St John himself. Throughout his life, Polycarp was well known for his love and wisdom, and the way that he lived his life. *"It is yet present to my mind with what gravity he everywhere came in and went out; what was the sanctity of his deportment, the majesty of his countenance; and what were his holy exhortations to the people."* These are the words of St Irenaeus as he described the impact that Polycarp had on him and cites him as being the reason Irenaeus decided to become a Christian.

It was because of the teaching handed on to him by St John the Divine (amongst others) that Polycarp was able to defend the true Christian teachings from the heresies that began to emerge at this time. The sole surviving work attributed to him is the **Epistle of Polycarp to the Philippians**, a mosaic of references to the Septuagint, which, along with an account of **The Martyrdom of Polycarp**, forms part of the collection of writings which have become known in recent times as the **Apostolic Fathers**. He is among the earliest Christians whose writings survive to this day.

In his old age, Polycarp was betrayed by a servant and arrested. He was taken to the proconsul who was in the local stadium watching the games; the proconsul ordered him to renounce his faith and offer incense to the Roman Emperor, which he refused to do. His response to the proconsul displayed his deep love for Christ Jesus: *"These eighty-six years I have served Christ, and He has never done me wrong. How then can I blaspheme my King and Saviour? You threaten me with a fire that burns for a season, and after a little while is quenched; but you are ignorant of the fire of everlasting punishment that is prepared for the wicked."*

On Saturday, 23 February, during the proconsul of Lucius Statius Quadratus, c. 155 or 156, Polycarp was burned at the stake. However, the flames did not appear to touch him and so the executioner was ordered to thrust his spear into Polycarp to hasten his end.

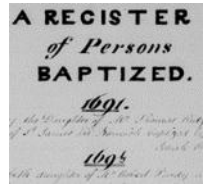
