SAINT OF THE MONTH

ST TERESA OF ÁVILA

Teresa was born in either Ávila or Gotarrendura in Spain in 1515AD. Her father was a very wealthy wool merchant and one of the leading citizens of Avila. Her mother was a devout Christian who taught Teresa and her brother about the lives of the saints from an early age. So enchanted were the children by the stories of these people that Teresa and her brother ran away from home to become martyrs for Christ (she was seven at the time). Fortunately they didn't get far – their uncle spotted them just outside the city walls and brought them home.

Very sadly, at the age of 14, their mother died and left Teresa devastated. As a result of her grief, Teresa adopted the Blessed Virgin Mary and devoted herself to her as a mother-figure. Teresa was sent to a local Augustinian convent for her schooling.

When she finished school, much to her father's disappointment, she opted to join the much less fanciful Carmelite Convent of the Incarnation (probably around 1535AD). After two years in the convent Teresa became seriously ill and was unable to get out of bed for a year, causing much concern for her community and her family. Teresa would later attribute her recovery to the miraculous intercessions of St Joseph. It was during this time of convalescence that she developed a love for silent prayer.

In 1558 Teresa began to consider the restoration of Carmelite life to its original observance of austerity, which had become relaxed. Her reform required utter withdrawal from society so that the nuns could meditate on divine law and, through a prayerful life of penance, exercise what she termed "our vocation of reparation" for the sins of humankind. She was greatly influenced by the writings of St Augustine, describing him as being a sinner like her. In March 1563, after Teresa had moved to the new convent house of St Joseph, she received the Pope's blessing for this new Order, based on the primary principles of absolute poverty and renunciation of ownership of property, which she proceeded to formulate into a "constitution". In the year 1567, while at Medina del Campo, Spain, she met a young Carmelite priest, Juan de Yepes (he would later become known as St John of the Cross, the poet and mystic), and he was very keen to initiate the Carmelite Reform for men (which he did a year later).

Her books on prayer and mysticism have been widely read since they were first published, written from her own deep experience of the many levels of prayer: *The Way of Perfection* (1583), *The Interior Castle* (1588), *Spiritual Relations, Exclamations of the Soul to God* (1588), and *Conceptions on the Love of God*. Despite frail health and many challenges (especially from local politicians) Teresa spent the rest of her life travelling around Spain where she established 16 more convents.

Teresa died on October 4th, 1582. Her feast day is 15th of October.

IN LOVING MEMORY OF

Ian Frank Colman Petch

1950 - 2025

Obituary written by his friends, Amanda and Hans Randall

Ian Petch died in May 2025 at the age of 75, leaving behind friends and colleagues, but also many people, both known and unknown, that he had helped throughout his life.

Born and bred in Norfolk, to a father who had been in the Indian Civil Service, and a mother that was connected to the Colman family of mustard fame (although which side of the blanket was not quite known), he was an only child.



He grew up faithfully involved with the Anglo-Catholic Church in that county, developing a great devotion to Our Lady of Walsingham. His mother also instilled in him a deep and fanatical love of The Archers. Hans recalls that when his Mother invited Ian over for the evening, she would never expect him until after The Archers was over at 7.15!

lan was also quick, clever and witty, with an interest in a variety of topics that provided him with solace and interest through his life. As a teenager, he went to work at Tilletts the Jeweller in Norwich where he developed his life-long love for jewellery and antiques. He became so good at his job, and so knowledgeable, that Mr Tillett wished to keep him on as an apprentice. However Ian had developed a strong vocation to be a teacher and left to attend Leeds University to study French. Whilst at University he lodged with the Mirfield Fathers of the Community of the Resurrection, an Anglo-Catholic community, and he spoke very fondly of his time with them.


At the tender age of twenty-five, he answered a job application as a French Teacher at Elizabeth College and Guernsey would become his home, and St Stephens's his Church, for the next 50 years.

As a French Master, he was conscientious and very well-liked by the boys - he was known as one of the 'Good Ones'. They could confide in him with confidence, and he rarely had discipline problems due to his quick and sometimes acerbic wit. He rarely needed to raise his voice, but when required, was known to have deadly accuracy with a board rubber - thrown onto a desk and throwing up clouds of chalk!

He retired early from teaching, after the death of his parents, and busied himself with a number of projects, including running an antiques shop in Trinity Square. He had a good eye for beautiful things. As he said once, "It's all a matter of taste - good taste ... and bad taste". He also volunteered, including working at Mostly Books, the Victorian Walled Garden at Sausmarez Park and latterly for Edible Guernsey.

lan didn't suffer fools gladly, but he did suffer them compassionately. He had a strong calling to help others, and often helped those that society had deemed lost causes, even to his own detriment. He, who had little money of his own, would give freely to those he felt to be in need, leaving nothing for himself. He would often say, "You have to want what Jesus wants". He lived out a truly Christian life so privately and quietly, we may never know everything that he did. We were privileged to know him.


Both Susan and Paul looked at each other, puzzled by her saying they were getting used to it.




