As I reflected on this, my mind went off on a tangent (nothing changes there) and I was thinking about how far we have come in our technological world.



Our first computer we bought just after we were married (so thirty years ago this month) and when I think back now, it was so basic and so limited, although it was great for its time. Over the years there have been many upgrades and the computers have become superfast with loads of memory. However, I find myself also reflecting on how impatient we have become in the meantime. It was frustrating waiting for the dial-up, but we waited... Nowadays we become impatient when we have a few seconds lag between entering the instruction and the computer doing it. And we won't even mention Wi-Fi speeds...

My mind began following this path down the rabbit hole and then turned, as it so often does, into our spiritual journey. Despite the many and varied technological advances that we have made, I pondered if we have lost too much in the process? The idea and concept of the sacred mystery of God has taken a back seat in our efforts to know "how everything works". It would appear as if we have filled our lives with busyness and noise and lost the art of sitting in silent awe and wonder.

The Psalmist captures this thought so well, "So would I gaze upon You in Your holy place, that I might behold Your power and Your glory." (Psalm 63:3). Having chased all that this world has to offer and repeatedly coming up feeling empty, people are rediscovering the joy of the presence of the Divine. This brings great hope to the hearts of us all and we pray that Guernsey may well experience the same. "Our help is in the name of the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth." (Psalm 124: 8).

The more things change, the more they remain the same. There is a fundamental basic human need for acceptance and love that no amount of technology can change, nor any noise or busyness. It all comes down to our understanding that we are a very small part of a universal creation set in place by the One who loves us more than life itself. And it is with that thought in my mind that I remember to save these ramblings... technology!

As I begin my third year in Guernsey, I am constantly filled with a sense of such joy and peace at being here. Thank you to every one of you who have made us feel so welcome and who have encouraged us in our stay here – we appreciate your love so much. God bless you and hold you close to His heart always. ## Saint of the Month

ST MICHAEL

The Archangel Michael is mentioned only four times in the Bible, either defending Israel against her enemies or fighting against the devil and his minions. He is celebrated in Jewish, Christian and Islamic circles as the great warrior of heaven. Michael is always depicted as holding a sword in his hand.

In the Revelation according to St John, before the creation of humankind, there was a war in heaven. This was fought amongst the angels themselves, God did not get involved (as always God allows His creatures to have free will).

We are told that there were two distinct groups; one led by the devil (or Satan or Lucifer or the dragon) who wanted to have some of the glory that belongs to God to be theirs, and Michael and his followers who believed that glory belongs to God alone. It was a mighty battle – there were feathers everywhere!

"For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms." (Ephesians 6:12). St Paul reminds us that we struggle in our fight to overcome evil and sin, but that we do not fight alone. Probably because of the association with battle, St Michael has also been called the "Angel of Death". This, for Christians, is not a sinister role at all, but rather that he comes to take our souls into heaven when we die so that there is never a moment when we are not being protected by Michael.

The Book of Enoch lists him as one of seven archangels (the remaining names are Uriel, Raguel, Raphael, Sariel, Gabriel, and Remiel), who in the Book of Tobit "stand ready and enter before the glory of the Lord". The seven archangels (or four, as Anglican traditions differ but always include Michael) were associated with the branches of the menorah, the sacred seven-branched lampstand in the Temple as the seven spirits before the throne of God, and this is reflected in the Book of Revelation 4:5. "From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings and peals of thunder. In front of the throne, seven lamps were blazing. These are the seven spirits of God."

These passages have led Christians to see Michael as the protector of the Church and he is the patron saint of soldiers. We draw comfort from knowing that Michael is on our side and that he is helping us in our daily fights against sin, the world and the devil.

Michaelmas, or the Feast of St Michael and All Angels, falls on the 29th of September.

#### IN LOVING MEMORY OF

## David James Adrian Amory

11th December 1944 – 24th March 2025

Eulogy written by his son, Peter, and shared by Peter at David's funeral on 8th of April 2025

David Amory was born towards the end of the Second World War, and David heralded a fresh start for his family. His father demobbed from the Navy and soon bought a smallholding in the Hampshire village of Medstead. David grew up with his sister Emmie, roaming the fields and orchard with a menagerie of chickens, ducks, geese and rabbits - as well as a dog and a cat. David had a lifelong love of the countryside and its creatures.

In his mid-teens, David embarked on his naval career. It's what the Amory men did. His father, uncles, and older brother Roy had all served in the Royal Navy, so David carried on the family tradition by enlisting at HMS Ganges at the age of 16.

HMS Ganges' passing out ceremony involved ascending the imposing ship's mast and passing over the top yardarm at 142 feet off the ground.

On a family visit to HMS Ganges before it decommissioned, David explained that back in 1960, health and safety consisted of top tips like, "Don't fall off."

Whilst David said climbing the mast was the scariest thing he'd done, that climb - and the decision to set off on a career in the Fleet Air Arm - launched him on an amazing collection of adventures and opportunities.

David travelled the world with the Navy, undertaking year-long tours on both HMS *Centaur* and HMS *Ark Royal*. He visited a vast array of countries, including Africa, America, India, Hong Kong, Singapore, Malta, and Gibraltar, keeping in touch with his parents and siblings with welcome letters and postcards from all corners of the world. The Navy helped shape David, broadening his horizons, training him as a qualified aircraft engineer - and, less well known, it started his fledgling music career when he was part of the Ship's Company and Band of HMS *Ark Royal*, which released a single in 1977 following the airing of the *Sailor* documentary series in 1976. It was that version we played during his funeral service.

"Worse things happen at sea" was one of David's favourite sayings, embodying his unfazed and calm response to every challenge or bump in the road. It reminded us that he had been places and done things - and that he could rise above the everyday. It's this relaxed and unwavering style, combined with a great sense of humour that his son's Philly and Peter, do their best to emulate.

David's time in the Navy also led him to meet Barbara. While stationed at Lee-on-Solent, developing complete tool kits for Navy aircraft, he noted that RAF Oldham had a Christmas Ball on December 11<sup>th</sup> - his birthday. He asked some friends in Alton if they knew anyone he could take. A blind date was arranged, and Barbara was the lucky lady. That was the start of 53 wonderful years together. David came to Guernsey that Christmas, and they married at St Stephen's Church the following October. A few years later, David's first son, Peter, was born here in Guernsey while David was stationed at Jacksonville Airbase in Florida. Two years later, in 1977, his second son, Philip, arrived on the scene while the family was living in Thetford, when David was stationed at RAF Honington.

Following David's final tour on HMS *Ark Royal* and its subsequent decommissioning, David took up a commission at Yeovilton Airbase, looking after 899's Flying Fist Squadron of Jump Jet Harriers. The family settled in Curry Rivel, Somerset, where family life seemed to revolve around building Lego, weekend camping trips, and regular visits to Guernsey.

In 1984, David concluded his naval career after 24 years, and the family made the move to Guernsey, drawn by the opportunities life here offered the family.

Once in Guernsey, David put his aircraft engineering skills to use working for Anglo Normandy, keeping Aurigny's fleet of Islanders and Trilanders in the air, before making the leap to join the Civil Service.

Although neither of David's sons carried on the family tradition of joining the Royal Navy, they both now work in the Civil Service.

Following David's passing, Peter was touched by the number of people who spoke to him about their time working with his father.

There were a number of common themes that came up when people spoke to Peter about working with his father. Most mention his sense of humour, his easy-going nature, and - of course - his size. At 6 foot 5, he was the sort of person you noticed when he entered a room, with his big smile and warm welcome.

In fact, it was because of that towering presence - and the sight of him striding down the high street - that he earned the nickname "**The Legend**." It was his son Phil who started using it, and it stuck. He became known to many simply as *The Legend*. And he lived up to it - not just in stature, but in character.

After retirement, David and Barbara found a new rhythm to their life of leisure. They travelled extensively with extended trips to Australia and Canada to visit their sons whilst they were living and working abroad, enjoyed cruises, and took regular trips to Scotland - a place close to both their hearts.

They became involved in charitable activities, such as the St John's Library Service. David also took the lead in running the annual commemoration and memorial service for HMS *Charybdis* and HMS *Limbourne*.

Retirement also allowed David to dedicate more time to one of his family's true passions - Lego. David was a huge fan from the day he bought Peter his first Lego set in 1979 - an Esso fuel tanker, as compensation for a hospital stay. Long before Lego ever marketed "Adults Welcome", David was there, building up an impressive collection.

Another of David's great loves was motor racing, particularly Formula 1. It's a passion that both his sons inherited. Sunday family gatherings were a staple during the F1 season, with Barbara having to adjust the Sunday roasts around the racing start times. More often than not, David would be snoozing through the racing, resulting in Peter and Phil bringing him up to speed with the racing action at intervals.


David leaves behind a legacy of service, humour, curiosity, and care. He was a towering figure - literally and figuratively - with a warm heart, a quick wit, and a deep love for Barbie, his family, his friends, and the small joys of life: a quiet walk in nature, a perfectly built Lego set, or a Sunday spent watching (or sleeping through) the Grand Prix.

We will miss his laugh, his stories, his unflappable calm, and his steady presence in our lives. But we carry his spirit with us - in the way we live, the way we love, and the way we face life's challenges with a smile and a shrug: "Worse things happen at sea."

David would now want us to gather, to swap stories, to laugh, and to raise a glass together. Or as he would have said himself:

"Time for the bun fight over the road."
